Agricultural and Horticultural Products Regulatory Review

For information

The Agricultural and Horticultural Products Review has moved firmly into the analysis stage, with work well underway across the issues and causes, options, and economic workstreams.

We are continuing to analyse the submissions and group the issues into key themes. We are developing a plan to work though analysing and verifying the issues raised.

Agencies have provided feedback on high level initial options identified, and we are meeting with them to discuss their feedback and views. Insights from their experience, including where options have been considered in the past, will be useful in developing our analysis recommendations.

We have assessed three proposals for targeted quantitative economic analysis that we received from economic consultancy firms. We have selected Sense Partners as the preferred provider and they will commence work next week following conclusion of the contract arrangements.

Members of the Agricultural and Horticultural Products Review team met with the Department of Conservation on Tuesday 24 August to understand their perspective on access to products for

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pest management purposes. They raised concerns consistent with other stakeholders and will be providing us with some further information on their experiences.

Early Childhood Education Regulatory Review

For information

All 2323 submissions have been read, tagged and analysed. On 11 October, we will provide you with a report summarising the themes from all engagement.

Testing of initial findings and recommendations has started with Ministry of Education, Education Review Office, Ministry of Health and Ministry for Primary Industry regulatory subject matter experts. The purpose of testing is to:

- Understand the level of agreement on our findings and recommendations
- Document where there is disagreement on our findings and recommendations
- Confirm where additional information is required
- Describe the implications of our recommendations, including risks and trade-offs
- Discuss the cost and time required for implementation.

Testing workshops will continue until the end of October. On 18 October, we will provide you with our initial findings on our analysis of the ECE licensing criteria, with a broader view of our findings presented to you on 15 November.

During September, the Early Childhood Education Sector Regulatory Review team has been working with Ministry of Education regional advisors responsible for Te Kōhanga Reo, the **s9(2)(a)** of Te Kōhanga Reo National Trust, and Ministry of Education Pasifika Advisors to confirm site visits. Site visits have now been confirmed for Te Kōhanga Reo on 2 and 3 October in the Waikato region; Puna Reo in the Manawatu 9 Oct and two Pacifica Centres in the Wellington region on 4 October.

We will provide the Early Childhood Education Sector Review monthly update to your office next week.

Statement of appropriation

For information

As agreed by the Minister of Finance, the Ministry is exempt from producing an Annual Report for the 2023/24 financial year. Instead, we are required to produce a statement of appropriation which reports on the statement of expenditure against appropriations, statement of capital injections against appropriations, and statements of unappropriated expenditure and capital injections. The chief executive also ensures that end-of-year performance information on each appropriation administered by the Ministry is provided in accordance with sections 19B and 19C of the Public Finance Act 1989. At the end of the financial year the statement and details as required by section 45A are provided and audited as if they were an annual report.

This statement of appropriation contains all information required of the Ministry to assure effective financial management in the 23/24 financial year. The statement of appropriation has the same requirements to be presented to the House within 15 days of the issue of the audit opinion.

As such the Secretary for Regulation asserts that this information has been prepared in accordance with sections 19C and 45A, taking into account the exemption provided by the Minister of Finance under section 45I(1).
