Updates

RIA non-compliance: Modifying the Sentencing (Reinstating Three Strikes) Amendment Bill

For information

Minister McKee as Associate Minister of Justice is preparing a paper to seek Cabinet agreement to two modifications to the Sentencing (Reinstating Three Strikes) Amendment Bill. The proposals relate to the reducing the length of qualifying sentences, and the inclusion of strikes obtained under the previous Three Strikes scheme into scope of the proposed new scheme. We understand this is being considered by Cabinet on 14 October.

A Regulatory Impact Statement (RIS) was completed when substantive policy decisions were taken, however the impact analysis in this RIS did not sufficiently cover the detail of these proposed modifications. The Ministry for Regulation's RIA Team requested the Ministry of Justice update the previous RIS with a short annex to provide more specific impact analysis to support Cabinet's decision-making. The Ministry of Justice advised that they would not be able to complete this annex in the timeframe available.

The Ministry of Justice and the Ministry for Regulation have agreed that a post-implementation assessment will be developed and provided to Cabinet no later than four years' time from enactment of the legislation. While post-implementation assessments have previously been required sooner after enactment, given the nature of the policy there is a need for a lead-in period for offending, convictions, sentencing and appeals to occur before the policy can be assessed.






Agricultural and Horticultural Products Regulatory Review

For information

This week the Agricultural and Horticultural Products Regulatory Review team (Review team) and agency secondees have participated in a series of workshops to undertake a root cause analysis of the issues reported by stakeholders. The Review team are writing up the results and will test with agencies and the Sector Reference Group.

We have entered into a contract with Sense Partners to deliver quantitative economic analysis to support the review and the final report. We expect to agree scenarios for their modelling in the coming weeks.

We have met with agencies to understand their feedback and views on initial options identified, and any limitations or constraints that may be required to continue to effectively manage risks. The results of root cause analysis will be used to narrow down options to potential recommendations and identify where further recommendations may be required.

We will be meeting with the sector reference group on Tuesday 8 September, and intend to discuss initial results from the root cause analysis, and initial options that have been identified.

Early Childhood Education Regulatory Review

For information

The Early Childhood Education Sector Regulatory Review continues to analyse and test initial findings and recommendations with Ministry of Education, Education Review Office, Ministry of Health and Ministry for Primary Industry regulatory subject matter experts. The purpose of testing is to:

- Understand the level of agreement on our findings and recommendations.
- Document where there is disagreement on our findings and recommendations.
- Confirm where additional information is required.
- Describe the implications of our recommendations, including risks and trade-offs.
- Discuss the cost and time required for implementation.

To date, we have held seven testing workshops covering regulatory monitoring, regulatory capability and performance, licencing criteria (multiple workshops), regulatory tools and curriculum, qualifications and ratios. Our initial findings on licencing criteria will be provided to you by the end of October.

On 11 October we will provide you with a report summarising the themes from all engagement and a briefing that outlines our lines of inquiry. We are currently analysing the themes to:

- Confirm which themes are in scope of the Terms of Reference for the Review
- Align our current areas of analysis and identify any gaps
- Use as evidence for our current areas of analysis.

We reported to you last week that visits to Te Kōhanga Reo centres were scheduled for 2 and 3 October. We have received a late notice request from Te Kōhanga Reo to move the Waikato visits to the following week starting 7 October. The visits to two Pacific Peoples childcare centres in the Wellington region on 4 October remain unchanged, along with the Puna Reo visit scheduled in the Manawatu on 9 October.

This week we have provided you with the monthly update of the Early Childhood Education Sector Regulatory review.
